ND 2-1-1

2-1-1 is an easy-to-remember telephone number that connects people with important community services. This statewide information, referral, and crisis management service is FREE and operator-serviced 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.

Examples of the types of assistance provided are: Basic human needs resources, Physical and mental health provider referrals, Services for older Americans and people with disabilities, Community program resources, Emergency service provider referrals, Crisis management services, including suicide intervention, domestic violence, supportive listening, etc.

North Dakota Bridge to Benefits

ND Department of Human Services

Provides services that help vulnerable North Dakotans of all ages maintain or enhance their quality of life, which may be threatened by lack of financial resources, emotional crises, disabling conditions, or an inability to protect themselves.

The department provides programs in the following areas: Adults and Aging, Child Support Enforcement, Children and Family, Public Assistance (Food Stamps, Healthy Steps, Temporary Assistance to Needy Families), Medical, Mental Health and Substance Abuse, Services for Individuals with Disabilities. Social Service offices are located in each county across ND. Social Service agencies exist to provide public assistance and services to residents in emergency situations. Disability

The Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) disability programs are the largest of several Federal programs providing assistance to people with disabilities. Both are administered by the Social Security Administration (SSA) and only individuals who have a disability and meet medical criteria may qualify for benefits under either program.

Employment Benefits



COBRA provides you the option of temporarily continuing your company's group health coverage when you experience a "qualifying event" such as when you quit a job, if your job is eliminated or if your hours are significantly reduced. You can't continue coverage if you're released for gross misconduct. When you leave a job, plan administrators must notify you of your eligibility and give you 60 days to accept or reject the coverage.

Temporary Unemployment Benefits are available to those who have lost their jobs through no fault of their own while they search for new jobs. Job Service North Dakota administers the state unemployment insurance program. Basic requirements for collection include:

- You must have been employed. Job Service of North Dakota publishes requirements for wages earned or time worked during an established period of time referred to as a "base period."
- You must be determined to be unemployed through no fault of your own as defined under North Dakota law.
- You must file ongoing claims and respond to questions concerning your continued eligibility. You must report any earnings from work and any job offers or refusal of work during any claim period.

Public Health Centers - North Dakota's public health system is made up of 28 single- and multi-county local public health units. Services offered by each public health unit vary, but all health units provide services in the areas of maternal and child health, health promotion and education, and disease prevention and control. Some local public health units maintain environmental health programs; others partner with the North Dakota Department of Health to provide environmental services such as public water system inspections, nuisance and hazard abatement, and food service inspections.
